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FROM THE DESK OF THE HEADMASTER

The Summer Term 2023

This term's edition of *The Westcliff Diary* once again reflects the commitment and enthusiasm of the WHSB staff and pupils in their working together to ensure all in the School community may continue to access the highest quality extra-curricular clubs, societies, and other activities. The personal development of our pupils is at the forefront of our work, and central to our Learner Profile. I would like to thank the staff and pupils for their determination in driving forward and developing those opportunities and I hope pupils, parents, staff, Old Westcliffians and friends of the School enjoy this edition of our termly Diary.

We are fortunate that so many of our pupils recognise the value of our extra-curricular programme, in terms of their personal development, expanding their horizons and opening opportunities for themselves in the future. I urge all pupils to engage fully with the wide range of enjoyable and challenging activities on offer and, to any pupil who has yet to fully embrace our varied programme, I encourage him or her to take the leap and to try something new. We appreciate that engagement with new activities and meeting new friends can push a pupil beyond their natural comfort zone, but there is plenty of support on hand and challenging oneself in new ways is so important for healthy personal development. Should pupils experience concerns or difficulties in becoming involved in a particular activity, or wish to discuss their options with a member of staff, they are most welcome to speak with a member of staff in their Pastoral Office, a student in our Sixth Form Leadership and/or Mentor Team, a club or activity leader, Mr Barber (House Co-ordinator), or with Mr Jeffreys (Associate Assistant Head / Head of History). We have witnessed the transformative nature of wide and varied engagement with the extra-curricular programme and will do all that we can to offer support where necessary.

The School Library

Parents will be aware from previous editions of the Diary that the School Library and its wonderful staff, Mrs

Schofield (Librarian) and Mrs Oates (Assistant Librarian) play a vital role in encouraging reading within our community. Reading is at the heart of a good education and the Library staff, working closely with Mr Derrick (Associate Assistant Head / Director of Music), continue to develop innovative ways in which to encourage our pupils to expand their reading. I am delighted to inform parents that from this coming September we shall be piloting a new reading initiative with our Year 7 pupils to encourage them to broaden their reading and further details will follow shortly. If the pilot is successful, we anticipate extending it to all Year groups in due course. I would like to take the opportunity to extend my thanks to Mr Derrick for his superb support in developing this exciting project. My thanks also to Mrs Schofield and Mrs Oates for the terrific support they provide to our pupils.

Public Examinations

As we continue with our programme of activities in earnest, we are also mindful that the Summer Term is particularly busy and important for those students sitting GCSE and A Level Examinations. During the Easter Break, I know that many of these students have been taking advantage of the revision classes running in the School and, with thanks to the staff involved in delivering those classes, I am sure those additional study sessions will have been of great value.

The staff at WHSB, both within the pastoral system and in our subject departments continue to provide guidance and support to those students preparing for their examinations later this term, and students should not hesitate to seek additional support whenever needed. Equally, if parents have any concerns or believe their son or daughter is in need of assistance, they should contact the relevant Pastoral Office without delay. Last term's edition of *The Westcliff Diary* also contained some helpful advice on revision strategies, and we shall continue to provide guidance and assistance through our usual systems, including Assemblies and Form Periods. Equally, I urge the students to take on board the feedback from their teachers included in the most recent set of

Reports, and to seek support in addressing concerns or other matters raised in order to maximise their potential in the forthcoming examinations.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish all the students taking the Public Examinations this term the very best of luck with their preparation and in the examinations when the time arrives.

Capital Works within the School

Many in the School community will be aware that our original project to replace the entire, original 1920s heating system across the Main School Building was successfully completed in the autumn last year. I am pleased to report that the new system is working well and, aside from the obvious benefits for pupils and staff in terms of an effective heating system, and therefore a more comfortable learning environment, we are looking forward to realising some of the economic benefits too, such as lower energy costs and reduced maintenance.

The School has benefitted from a grant of just over £1 million from the Department for Education (DfE) to complete the heating project, and we have a second phase of this project which, necessarily, has been scheduled for completion during the coming summer holiday break. This is a particularly disruptive phase as it involves the complete removal and replacement of the flooring in the School Hall and therefore, for practical reasons, works can only commence when the School is no longer in session. Whilst this project will see the completion of all heating works, we are also excited by our plans to install new flooring in the Hall and to update and refurbish that general environment, as this is long overdue.

I am also pleased to report that we intend to progress plans this year to update the pupils' toilet facilities on the east side of the School site, and to work on improving changing facilities for female students. The Governing Board has set aside provision to press ahead with modified plans to update these facilities, following a number of unsuccessful bids to the DfE for funds to replace the School's East Toilet Block and to provide improved changing facilities for girls. Whilst it has been necessary to scale back the plans for these facilities due to the absence of funding from the DfE, our plans include a second phase which would bring our new facilities much closer to our original aspirations for these areas, but that second phase would almost certainly necessitate fundraising within the School community. However, in the meantime, we anticipate that the pupils at WHSB will benefit greatly from the updated facilities planned for phase 1 of this project during the summer holiday break this year.

Teacher Recruitment and Development

We are fortunate at WHSB that we continue to attract teaching colleagues of the highest calibre; our teachers provide an unparalleled standard of teaching to the pupils at Westcliff High School for Boys, in addition to adding value to the educational opportunities available to our young people through the many extra-curricular activities represented here. The commitment from our teachers to their work is second to none and that is so evident in the outcomes and development of our pupils.

Nationally, the teaching profession faces significant difficulties in relation to teacher recruitment and that creates challenges for all schools. However, we also recognise that there are additional challenges for this School and others in our region, as the high property prices relative to teachers' salaries only serve to add to make settling in the area more difficult for young teachers.

You will no doubt be aware that, due to concern regarding the decline in teachers' real salaries, the National Education Union (NEU) decided to take Industrial Action on particular days during February and March 2023.

WHSB remained open for all Year groups throughout the days of that Industrial Action and, with some necessary changes to the timetable, we were able to maintain our familiar routines and important teaching and learning for the benefit of the pupils. We were able to remain open and offer this level of provision because a substantial majority of teachers at WHSB decided that they would not take Action, and it was only right that we responded to that feeling. As I noted in my communications with parents, schools have a duty to provide education for pupils on 190 days each year and that was not a duty to be lightly set aside. It is also the case that our current pupils have suffered significant disruption to their education as a result of the circumstances of the pandemic and lockdowns, and therefore I believed remaining open as usual was important.

I have raised the matter of teachers' salaries and recruitment difficulties with both the Education Minister and our MP, as I believe the present difficulties have reached a point of crisis and I, and my Headteacher colleagues locally, will continue to ensure these matters are raised at a national level at every opportunity.

In the meantime, the quality of the teaching our pupils are able to access through my colleagues at WHSB is not

taken for granted, and am most grateful to the many parents who offered such positive observations in this regard during the recent Industrial Action.

On the matter of teaching, I would like to offer my sincere thanks to Dr Shepherd for his superb support in developing the WHSB Teacher Profile, which has now been implemented and is well on the way to being embedded into our systems and processes. Pupils and parents will be familiar with our well-established Learner Profile, and its importance to life at WHSB. The Teacher Profile serves to facilitate the delivery of the Learner Profile attributes and to define the essence of teaching at WHSB. The design of the School's Learner Profile was originally based on my observations of the effectiveness of similar in implementing and delivering the International Baccalaureate qualification in the grammar school in which I worked prior to taking up my post at WHSB. I was impressed by the impact of a similar structure then, and I am delighted with the way in which pupils and staff have responded positively to the implementation of our own, adapted Learner Profile; it has become integral to our provision at WHSB. The addition of The Teacher Profile has been on our development agenda for a number of years, specifically because I have observed that too as delivering significant benefits in relation to the International Baccalaureate; it seemed that similar would be transferable to our own provision. We have been delayed only by capacity, and following Dr Shepherd's appointment to the role of Associate Assistant Head in September 2021, we have been able to take this important development forward, and I would like to acknowledge his outstanding support in this regard.

I am also most grateful to our teaching staff for positively embracing the development of The Teacher Profile; it is, once again, a reflection of their commitment and dedication towards their responsibilities

and I believe we shall benefit greatly from the addition of this provision.

Staff Changes for the Summer Term

At the start of the Summer Term we are delighted to welcome Ms Peel who joins the English Department as the Lower School Co-ordinator. Ms Peel will be joined in the English Department by Mr Wheeler who will join the School following the summer half-term break.

We are also pleased to welcome Mr Gombas who joins us as an additional Teaching Assistant, and Mrs J James who joins us in the role of Sixth Form Pastoral Assistant. We say a fond farewell to Mrs Bonney who has covered a number of roles (most recently Middle School Pastoral Tutor) since joining us in August 2021 and we thank her for her splendid service. We also welcome Mr Wilson who takes on the role of Middle School Pastoral Tutor.

We continue to advertise for a Head of Religious Studies. Currently, Mr Derrick (Director of Music/Associate Assistant Head) has taken on the position of Acting Head of Religious Studies and Mrs Cook has additional responsibilities (in relation to the Lower School) within the Religious Studies Department.

I would like to record my thanks to Mr Jeffreys (Associate Assistant Head / Head of History) and Mrs Shankster (Middle School Progress Leader) for their outstanding support and organisation in relation to the preparation of material for this edition of *The Westcliff Diary*.





LOWER SIXTH EXAMINATIONS


Thursday 4 - Monday 15 May 2023

THE KING'S CORONATION

Monday 8 May 2023

The crowning of King Charles III will give the School a second additional Bank Holiday in this School Year as 2023 becomes a Coronation Year. In historical terms, the arrival of King Charles III is both interesting and historic. At 73 years, 9 months and 23 days, the King is the oldest monarch of the 55 who have come to the English/British throne since 871. The previous oldest, King William IV, was a sprightly 64 years 10 months and 3 days at his coronation in 1830. If the throne had bypassed Charles and gone to the 40-year-old Prince William, the new King William V would still have been the eleventh oldest King to ascend the throne, and actually two years older than William the Conqueror when he took power in 1066. If 9-year-old George had taken the throne as King George VII, he would have been around the same age as Aethelred the Unready and as Edward VI (son of Henry VIII) when they took the throne. There would still have been two younger, baby Kings – Henry III and Henry VI. The late Queen's lengthy reign may well be reflected in a sequence of older monarchs for decades to come.

The coronation ceremony itself is shrouded in history, mysticism and ceremony. The task has been performed by the Archbishop

of Canterbury for centuries. Canterbury has led the English Church since Augustine arrived in the Jutish Kingdom of Kent in 597AD, head of a Catholic mission to Christianise pagan England. Aethelberht, King of Kent, gave Augustine land in his capital city of Canterbury and the former prior of St Andrew's Abbey in Rome became the first English Archbishop there. As Head of the English Church since 1534, the monarch is now crowned not by a Catholic archbishop but by an Anglican one.

The ceremony involves the Sovereign taking the Coronation Oath. Although an Oath had been taken at royal coronations for many centuries, by the time of the 1688 Glorious Revolution, this Oath was judged to have become meaningless to a Parliament determined to bind the Monarch ever more strongly. As a result, Parliament set down the Coronation Oath Act of 1688, which was approved by King William and Queen Mary, in order to maintain "the true Profession of the Gospel and the Protestant Reformed Religion Established by Law". Under George I, the section reading "this Kingdom of England" was replaced (after the Union with Scotland of 1707) by the words "this Kingdom of Great Britain".

Most recently in June 1953, the late Queen Elizabeth II undertook to rule according to law, to exercise justice with mercy

- promises symbolised by the four swords in the coronation regalia (the Crown Jewels) - and to maintain the Church of England.

Following the oath, the Sovereign is then 'anointed, blessed and consecrated' by the Archbishop. This anointment with oil is considered the most sacred and mystic element of the ceremony. Holy oil is symbolically touched on the monarch's head, chest and hands. For the coronation of King Charles, the oil selected will for the first time be completely animal-free, an olive oil scented with a mixture of jasmine, rose, sesame, cinnamon, orange blossom, and essential oils. This reflects oil from the Mount of Olives, a key early Christian site. The oil has been taken to the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, perhaps the most important Christian site in Jerusalem, and blessed there for its use in our King's Coronation.

Throughout this, the Sovereign is seated in King Edward's chair. This chair was commissioned in 1296 by King Edward I, hailed 'Hammer of the Scots', who had his throne-chair remade to include space for the Stone of Scone, Scotland's ancient stone of destiny on which its own monarchs were crowned. The chair was named for St Edward the Confessor and carved of oak by carpenter Walter of Durham, being finished in March 1300. It has been used by every monarch since 1626. The Stone of Destiny was returned to Scotland in 1996 and has been kept in Edinburgh Castle ever since but with the proviso that it be returned for use in coronations. This means that the Stone should be reunited with the Chair for this event.

As the next part of the ceremony, the King receives an Orb and Sceptre, ancient symbols of monarchy. The Orb is a symbol of Godly power, a hollow and 30cm wide gold sphere and cross. The orb itself symbolizes the world over which God rules while the cross reflects the Monarch's role as Head of the Church, and therefore God's Regent on earth. The Orb is mounted with 9 emeralds, 18 rubies, 9 sapphires, 365 diamonds, an amethyst and a glass stone. It was specially made for the coronation of King Charles II in 1661 - the current King will be the first King Charles to use it in a coronation since then. Meanwhile, the Sceptre represents the Monarch's provision of good government in the temporal sphere. 92 cm long and first used in 1661, the Sceptre holds the infamous 530-carat Cullinan I diamond, the world's largest, found in 1905 in South Africa and popularly known as the 'First Star of Africa'.

After receiving the Orb and Sceptre, the Archbishop places St Edward's Crown on the Sovereign's head. This Crown was remade in 1661 after its original, made for St Edward the Confessor and thereafter a holy relic, was melted down by Cromwell during the Interregnum. The remade Crown is solid 22-carat gold, 12 inches tall, weighing 4.9lb and decorated with 444 precious stones. The Crown was not used between 1689 and 1911 but King George V revived its use then and it has been used ever since.

At the funeral of our late Queen Elizabeth II, the country was privileged to see deeper into this process when, at St George's Chapel Windsor, the Crown, Orb and Sceptre was taken from atop her coffin and handed to priests of the Anglican religion, who then placed these on the Chapel's altar. The antiquity of these ceremonial actions was startling and powerful. It was as if these holy items were being taken from the late Queen and handed back, via High Priests, to the God who had awarded her the Crown so that, in time and at this Coronation, God might award Kingship to a new Sovereign through the granting of these symbols of power by his High Priest. Such a concept of Divinity in Kingship may hardly fit modern perceptions. But then, this is hardly a modern ceremony.

DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARDS



The Duke of Edinburgh Awards are designed to promote, among young people, a commitment to personal development, the development of strong leadership skills, and participation in outdoor activities. To achieve the Duke of Edinburgh Awards, candidates must complete a series of activities, including volunteering, developing new skills, physical activity, and undertaking an expedition.

Duke of Edinburgh Silver Award Thursday 11 – Saturday 13 May 2023



The Duke of Edinburgh Silver Award is a prestigious achievement for those young people in the United Kingdom who attain to this level. The Duke of Edinburgh Silver Award expeditions are designed to test participants' skills in outdoor activities, teamwork, and navigation. The expeditions involve camping overnight and walking a predetermined route with a team. The expeditions usually take place in areas of natural beauty, such as National Parks or other protected areas. The Duke of Edinburgh Silver Award requires participants to complete a three-day, two-night expedition.

This year's Duke of Edinburgh Silver Award expeditions will take place in the South Downs National Park for the Practice (Thursday 11 to Saturday 13 May) and the Peak District National Park for the Assessment (Wednesday 14 to Saturday 17 June). Both parks offer stunning natural scenery and challenging terrain, making them ideal locations for the Silver Award expeditions. The longer, four-day Assessment period reflects the extended travel time required to reach the destination, the additional field training required and the need to take time to upskill candidates' navigation techniques whilst also assessing their ability to cope with more challenging terrain.

In order to prepare for the Duke of Edinburgh Silver Award expeditions, participants must undergo extensive training. This training includes elements such as advanced map reading, compass work, and route planning. Participants must also learn essential outdoor skills, such as navigation in low visibility conditions, emergency procedures, and First Aid. Effective teamwork is a crucial aspect of the training, and participants must learn to work together and support each other throughout the expedition.

The remaining aspects of the Duke of Edinburgh Silver Award include volunteering, physical fitness, and developing new skills. Participants must complete a minimum of six months of volunteering, six months of physical fitness and three months of developing a skill, although pupils have discretion to swap the amount of time taken for each of the latter two elements. These activities allow participants to explore their interests, develop new skills, and give back to their communities.

Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award Friday 19 – Saturday 20 May 2023



To achieve the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award, participants must also complete a series of activities including volunteering, developing new skills, and a physical component, as well as undertaking two expeditions.

For the Volunteering, Skills and Physical sections, candidates must participate in one section over the course of six months and the other sections over a three-month period. Candidates are able to decide which section is matched with each of the timeframes.

To prepare for the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award expeditions, participants must undergo training during lunchtime and at after-school sessions. The training includes map reading, compass work, and route planning. Participants must also learn essential outdoor skills, such as cooking on a camping stove, pitching a tent, and packing a rucksack. Teamwork is a crucial aspect of the training, and participants must learn to work together and to support each other throughout the expedition.

In addition to the training, participants must also complete a Practice Expedition. The Practice Expedition is an opportunity for participants to put their skills into practice and test their endurance in a safe environment. The Practice Expedition takes place in a local area, and participants must walk for two days and camp overnight. The Practice Expedition, which will take place in the Danbury area and runs from Friday 19 to Saturday 20 May, is a valuable experience that prepares participants for the Assessment Expedition. This will take place from Friday 15 to Saturday 16 September, also around Danbury.

STRAVINSKY'S FIREBIRD, PERFORMED BY THE PHILHARMONIA ORCHESTRA

Thursday 18 May 2023

This concert by the world-class Philharmonia orchestra features music from Stravinsky's first major ballet, and a fiendish piano concerto by Prokofiev.

The Firebird was Stravinsky's first collaboration with the ballet choreographer Diaghilev and the Ballets Russes, a partnership that gave birth to some of the defining music of the early 20th century. The tale of a huntsman prince, a magical bird, an evil monster and 13 enchanted princesses is based on stories from Russian folklore. It is the perfect showcase for Stravinsky's masterful orchestration skills and harmonic and rhythmic originality. "Mark him well," said Diaghilev, "he is a man on the eve of celebrity".

Prokofiev's Scythian Suite also started life as a commission from the Ballets Russes, intended to capitalise on the success of



Stravinsky's The Rite of Spring a few years later. Prokofiev's music shares some of the visceral rhythmic power of Stravinsky's – he noted that, at the premiere, "the timpanist tore the kettledrum head with his furious blows".

Between these two comes a piano concerto no less vivid or powerful. Prokofiev's Piano Concerto No. 2 is full of savage energy. It makes huge technical demands of its soloist – even Prokofiev himself, an outstanding concert pianist, confessed "I do not manage to stay calm during the most difficult parts". In this concert, the concerto is in the more-than-capable hands of Behzod Abduraimov, acclaimed for his "virtuoso command and individuality of voice" (Gramophone).

- The different electoral systems used in and beyond the United Kingdom, and actions citizens can take in democratic and electoral processes in order to influence decisions locally, nationally and beyond;
- Other systems and forms of government, both democratic and non-democratic, beyond the United Kingdom;

- Local, regional and international governance, and the United Kingdom's relations with the rest of Europe, the Commonwealth, the United Nations and the wider world;
- The legal system in the UK, different sources of law, and how the law helps society deal with complex problems;
- Income and expenditure, credit and debt, insurance, savings and pensions, financial products and services, and how public money is raised and spent.

We are delighted to welcome our local Parliamentarian, Mrs Anna Firth MP, who will open the day for us. Our Joint Chairs of Governors, who are both solicitors, Mr Anthony Cole and Mrs Fiona Colwell, will give us an insight into the legal system within the UK, and their specific areas of legal practice. Mr Adam Berry, Senior Cash Management Consultant with HSBC and the School's Enterprise Adviser, in addition to members of our own Economics Department, will focus on both national and international economic and financial concerns.

PETER PAN

Wednesday 21 – Friday 23 June 2023

This Summer, Westcliff Drama is again taking to the stage to bring you J M Barrie's timeless classic, Peter Pan. Oh no it isn't!! No, that is the pantomime version, not the play. And it is testament to the power of Barrie's creation that the story of Peter Pan has been adapted and readapted so often into pantomime, musical, cartoon and play, creating a whole world of story telling for a plethora of audience types. However, our own aim will be to bring forward a very classic retelling of the tale of Peter Pan, working to the original book and playtext.

James Matthew Barrie came from a weaver family and was born in Angus, Scotland in May 1860. A graduate of Edinburgh University, Barrie worked as a journalist and published his first novel *Better Dead* in 1887. He started to write plays in the 1890s and his first play *Walker London*, a comedy mocking marriage, was warmly received. Barrie's own marriage, however, to actress Mary Ansell, was unhappy and ultimately ended in divorce. Perhaps to escape these troubles at home, Barrie took to walking in Kensington Gardens, where he met the Llewelyn-Davies brothers. This began a relationship with the five young brothers that is perhaps unclear and certainly uncomfortable in the modern climate. Barrie became extremely close to the boys and ultimately acted as their guardian after the death of their parents. The characteristics and life stories of these brothers formed the basis of his creation of Peter Pan.


Peter Pan first emerged as a character in the 1902 book *The Little White Bird*. The original character was extremely young, being just a seven-day old baby who had fallen from his cot and been lost by his nurse. In 1904, Peter Pan premiered as a piece of theatre on the London stage and was hugely successful. On the basis of the play, Barrie wrote a follow up book entitled *Peter and Wendy*, which was published in 1911. At his death in June 1937, Barrie gave the copyright to the children's hospital at Great Ormond Street, a hospital that Westcliff High School for Boys has supported regularly in the past through our Charity Committee. The story was transferred into an animated classic cartoon by

Disney in 1953 and acted as the basis for the Robin Williams feature film *Hook* in 1991. Musical versions of the play have also been generated and a second movie, *Peter Pan*, was released in 2003. Just as the boy himself never ages, neither it seems does the popularity of the story fade.

Our intention is to bring a very traditional telling of Peter Pan to our Westcliff audience. The original has a darkness and wistfulness to it that has been lost in some later adaptations. Centring around home and the nursery, the play bemoans the lost innocence of infancy and the forsaken safe space of the nursery. The three children, Wendy, John and Michael Darling, play out a range of infant fantasy adventures throughout the tale, swimming with mermaids, fighting with pirates and creating the original 'Wendy House' alongside the tragic Lost Boys. As Mother, Mrs Darling is a sweet protective presence while the Father-figure of Mr Darling is darkly menacing to these young children, often paired up with the darkly villainous Captain Hook. Many versions of the story present Hook as a loveable rogue but the original envisages a much darker and more chilling figure, who embodies the paternal threat that has echoed down the ages – "Just wait until your Father gets home". And Peter himself, famously 'the Boy who never Grows Up', is that permanent reminder of lost innocence that tears at our aging hearts. "To die," says Peter, "would be an awfully big adventure". Indeed.

Westcliff Drama will look forward to sharing this wonderful and stirring classic tale with you in the later stages of the Summer Term.

TEACHERS LEADING AS LIFELONG LEARNERS

If our students are looking for inspiration in terms of their quest to be Lifelong Learners, they would do well to turn to the examples set by their teachers. Students and parents may not be aware that Dr Shepherd has recently provided support in developing our Teacher Profile, which encapsulates everything that is special about teaching at Westcliff High School for Boys. One of the strands of our Teacher Profile is that teachers commit to being career-long learners. We achieve this in various ways as professionals, whether it be through engaging with research, reading books published about various aspects of teaching and learning, engaging in Continuing Professional Development (CPD) or even undertaking a Master's Degree in Education.

Teaching colleagues at all stages of their careers are involved in these types of CPD activities, and research has demonstrated that the opportunity to engage in high-quality CPD leads to greater job satisfaction and lower attrition rates within the teaching profession. Those in the early stages of their career are supported through training programmes such as the Post-Graduate Certificate in Education (PGCE) or through the newly developed Early Career Framework (ECF). Since September 2021, our Early Career Teachers (ECTs) have followed a two-year Induction programme. Each ECT has an experienced mentor, dedicated mentoring time, regular observations of teaching and feedback, and 10% release time (5% in year two) on top of usual preserved planning time in order to complete training activities. Our first cohort of Year 2 ECTs will complete the ECF this summer and we wish them all the best in their future careers.

OLD WESTCLIFFIAN ASSOCIATION



I am pleased to report that the assimilation of the Old Westcliffian Association into the School is proceeding well. Whilst the OWA embeds itself into the School's body and culture, the Steering Group wishes to ensure that OWA traditions are maintained.

The primary change in the thinking of those serving on the Steering Group is their clear understanding that the OWA is now the School, and the School is now the OWA. There is no longer a distinction between members of the OWA and School alumni. All alumni are part of the Old Westcliffian Association and, all that is required for a former pupil or member of staff to become a member, is for the School to receive and record their contact details. The School is seeking to ensure that it holds members' details in an accessible format, and therefore your Steering Group intends to be proactive in reaching out to those alumni with whom we may have lost contact to ensure that as many, if not all, future leavers remain in touch with us.

Our wish to expand the OWA is ambitious and it is worth noting that the OWA is open to all former WHSB pupils (including those who left at any stage of their education) and former WHSB staff, Trustees, and those who attended other schools but who received their tuition for Politics and/or Music A Levels at WHSB (this included a number of pupils from Westcliff High School for Girls long before our Sixth Form became co-educational).

As outlined in my Spring Report in *The Westcliff Diary*, the OWA is a multi-generational body. SUMMER SINFONIA CONCERT

Wednesday 5 July 2023

It has been a long time coming, but in the summer of 2022 a style of music finally gained that most sought-after symbol of musical legitimacy: A whole BBC Prom concert devoted to it. Comfortably sandwiched between concerts of music by Stravinsky and Beethoven sat a whole evening of Pokémon pieces, Kingdom Hearts cues, and Mario medleys. This was, of course, the 'Gaming Prom – From 8-bit to Infinity'.

If it is good enough for the largest music festival in the world, it is good enough for the Westcliff High School for Boys Sinfonia: This term's concert will feature music from classic and contemporary video games. It has come a long way from the beeps and blips of Tetris and Donkey Kong, with composers from film music and modern classical music spheres now frequently providing cues for games.

2005's Playstation 2 game *Shadow of the Colossus* has frequently been cited as one of the most compelling cases for video games as an art-form, not least by Oscar-winning director Guillermo del

Toro, who described the game as a "masterpiece". This musical suite by composer Kow Otani featured at the 2022 Prom and follows the literal highs and lows of a story that deals with meditative explorations on the themes of life and death, as well as climbing giant monsters to stab them in the head with a big sword. The music fluctuates between quiet, reflective, almost monastic choral themes, and bombastic action-packed cues.

Like the BBC nestled video game music in between two classical concerts, here the Sinfonia finds a place for Beethoven. His *Romance in F* is a beautifully lyrical piece written for orchestra and solo violin, in this concert performed by Upper Sixth student Henry Man. This gentle piece's juxtaposition with the previous suite's bluster reflects the tumultuous period in which Beethoven wrote this piece: It is an oasis of calm, sandwiched between the furious Third and Fifth symphonies.

Other pieces featured in this concert are best left as a surprise, but the programme is sure to delight gamers young and old. Tickets are available from [TicketSource](#) at the price of £5.00 for adults and free for pupils.

We encourage all pupils to throw themselves wholeheartedly into all these activities as the more they put in, the more they will gain!



Year 7 Enrichment: Geography Fieldwork in Southend

Pupils in Year 7 can look forward to a Geography fieldwork trip to Southend on Enrichment Day 2023. The trip provides an excellent opportunity for Geography students to study the local area, collect primary data, and work together collaboratively. The trip covers many different topic areas, including tourism, urban issues, settlement patterns, coastal processes and management, and population changes in the town. Pupils also get to practise a range of important skills, such as drawing field sketches, annotating photos, and collecting questionnaire responses. The results are then used back in the classroom to produce a fieldwork report.

Year 8 Enrichment: MFL Drama

Following all of the performances in the Westcliff Theatre, prizes will be awarded for the best performances.

Last year, we were very pleased with the enthusiasm of the Year 8 pupils who threw themselves into the day with gusto, and they showed determination in memorising as much of the dialogue





as they could within the time constraints. The highlight for many was dressing up and we are most grateful to Ms Cleave, the School's Drama Assistant, for her support in providing access to the costumes in the Westcliff Theatre and tips on costuming. Pupils are also encouraged to bring in their own costumes and props for the day.

We hope that Year 8 pupils will enjoy the Languages and Drama day in July, and we look forward to watching their performances.

LOWER SIXTH GEOLOGY TRIP: ISLE OF ARRAN, SCOTLAND

Saturday 8 - Friday 14 July 2023

A Level Geologists will visit the Isle of Arran between Saturday 8 and Friday 14 July 2023 in order to undertake their compulsory fieldwork studies. The field group will be based at the Lochranza Field Studies Centre on the north of the Island. From this location, Geologists will be able to study the nature of the rock, and record how these features were formed, including their fossil content, folding and faulting, and their plate tectonic settings

Part of the week will be spent undertaking investigative and

problem-solving field exercises related to the origin of the North Atlantic Ocean approximately 65 million years ago, before which time Scotland and Greenland were conjoined. This work will involve students in building their own geological maps.

The Isle of Arran is considered to be a world-class location for geological studies and the students will develop knowledge and understanding of field geology, and will be able to relate such work to their class studies. Transferable skills such as numeracy, problem-solving and teamwork are all developed within an area of outstanding natural beauty, characterised by mountainous glaciated terrain.



The Competition is organised every year by *Routes into Languages East* in partnership with Cambridge University's Faculty of Modern and Medieval Languages, the Cambridge University Bilingualism Network and Murray Edwards College, Cambridge. *Routes into Languages* works to promote the take-up of languages through cooperation between universities, schools and colleges in England.

To enter, pupils are asked to submit an original poem in a language they have learnt at School, or an account of a story or poem they remember being told in their mother tongue if this is a language other than English. Westcliff High School for Boys celebrates and values its status as a richly diverse community, with many of our pupils being bilingual; this competition offers such pupils an opportunity to celebrate this fantastic gift. This year, we had eight finalists who were shortlisted for the Finals event in Cambridge on 22 March 2023. To be shortlisted for the finals was a fantastic achievement, and all pupils deserve our congratulations. Two of our pupils were selected as winners in their Mother Tongue categories, Sujay Surenthiran (Year 8, Tamil) and Michael Toumbas (Year 11, Greek). In the Other Tongue competition, Quinn Williams (Year 11, German) won his category for the fourth consecutive year. Special congratulations go to our winners.

We will rehearse at School for a week before the trip and then travel north on Friday 4 August, ready for our first performance at the Space Upper Theatre venue at Niddry Street on Monday 7 August, the first of six before a paying public. Why not treat yourself to a whole new experience this summer, come up to Edinburgh, and join us and 250,000 other festival-goers at the 2023 Fringe?



TYPE B DYSON SPHERE CIVILISATION




